# Appendix 11-P3-1: Part 3 Gazetteers of Heritage Assets

## 1 Introduction

- 1.1. The gazetteer tables<sup>1</sup> presented in this appendix identify the following heritage assets relevant to the combined Parts 2 and 3 indicative works area of the Proposed Development at the area located next to Daventry:
  - a. Designated heritage assets within the indicative work areas and surrounding 500 m study area (**Table 1**); and
  - b. Non-designated heritage assets within the indicative work areas and surrounding 500 m study area (**Table 2**).
- 1.2 Some heritage assets are located in more than one study area where these extend into other Parts of the Proposed Development. Where this occurs, this is stated in the location column of the relevant gazetteers.
- 1.3 The locations of designated and non-designated heritage assets that correspond to each of the gazetteers are shown on the accompanying figures in Preliminary Environmental Information (PEI) Report **Volume 3**:
  - a. **Figure 11-P2&3-1: Part 3: Designated Heritage Assets**; and
  - b. **Figure 11-P2&3-2: Part 3: Non-Designated Heritage Assets**.
