1 Introduction

- 1.1. The gazetteer tables¹ presented in this appendix identify the following heritage assets relevant to the canal work area heritage (CWAH) 1-3 study areas in Part 2 of the Proposed Development:
 - a. Designated heritage assets within the indicative work areas and surrounding 500 m study areas (**Table 1**); and
 - b. Non-designated heritage assets within the indicative work areas and surrounding 500 m study areas (**Table 2**).
- 1.2 Some heritage assets are located in more than one study area where these extend into other Parts of the Proposed Development. Where this occurs, this is stated in the location column of the relevant gazetteers.
- 1.3 The locations of designated and non-designated heritage assets that correspond to each of the gazetteers are shown on the accompanying figures in Preliminary Environmental Information (PEI) Report **Volume 3**:
 - a. **Figure 11-P2-1: Part 2: Designated Heritage Assets**; and
 - b. **Figure 11-P2-2: Part 2: Non-Designated Heritage Assets**.

Originally a breastwork and a wall-walk of timber would have crowned the rampart, possibly with corner and interval towers. Only 14 examples of vexillation fortresses have been recorded in England.
