Appendix 11-P1B-1: Part 1b Gazetteers of Heritage Assets

1 Introduction

- 1.1. The gazetteer tables¹ presented in this appendix identify the following heritage assets relevant to Part 1b of the Proposed Development:
 - a. Designated heritage assets within the Part 1b Preliminary Order Limits and surrounding 500 metre (m) study area (**Table 1**); and
 - b. Non-designated heritage assets within the Part 1b Preliminary Order Limits and surrounding 500 m study area (**Table 2**).
- 1.2 Some heritage assets are located in more than one study area where these extend into other Parts of the Proposed Development. Where this occurs, this is stated in the location column of the relevant gazetteers.
- 1.3 The locations of designated and non-designated heritage assets that correspond to each of the gazetteers are shown on the accompanying figures in Preliminary Environmental Information (PEI) Report **Volume 3**:
 - a. **Figure 11-P1B-1: Part 1b: Designated Heritage Assets**; and
 - b. **Figure 11-P1B-2: Part 1b: Non-Designated Heritage Assets**.
